Fire, Water, and California Green Again

Prevention first. Water security. A greener and safer California.

MACA will treat wildfire as a year-round management challenge that can be reduced with fuel control, water reliability, home protection, and faster emergency response in every county.

- 1. Treat wildfire as a year-round state priority.** MACA will stop treating fire as a seasonal headline and instead manage risk every month through planning, maintenance, and measurable county preparedness targets.
- 2. Restore greener and fire-smart landscapes.** MACA will promote native, drought-smart, and fire-smart vegetation while clearing dead brush and abandoned fuel so communities are safer without wasting water.
- 3. Deliver stronger water readiness.** MACA will upgrade storage, hydrant reliability, pump backup power, recycled-water systems, and emergency reserves so neighborhoods are not left dry in a crisis.
- 4. Clear the fuel before it burns.** MACA will accelerate brush clearance, prescribed burns, thinning, canyon cleanup, and dead-tree removal around homes, schools, roads, and power corridors.
- 5. Protect homes and neighborhoods.** MACA will help families build defensible space, harden roofs and vents, and retrofit older homes so more properties survive ember storms and fast-moving fires.
- 6. Improve detection, response, and evacuation.** MACA will strengthen early warning systems, night-capable response, local evacuation planning, and mutual-aid readiness so disasters are met faster and more effectively.
- 7. Hold agencies accountable for results.** MACA will publish county-by-county scorecards on fuel reduction, water readiness, home protection, and emergency performance because preventable disasters are not acceptable.
